Course Overview: The course will engage students in in-depth analysis of core education issues of both a theoretical and practical nature. Topic areas include standards, learning environment, curriculum, student diversity, evaluation, technology, and professional ethics.

- Describe the major political, cultural, and historical influences that impact the identified issues in American education.

SPECIAL EDUCATION 50:300:305

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING 50:300:384

Course Overview: Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) is the process by which students of all ages understand, practice, and manage their emotions through setting and achieving positive goals while simultaneously learning to identify, feel, and show empathy for others. It includes establishing and maintaining positive relationships and making positive decisions.

Students will explore the social and emotional components of learning by identifying aspects of their own SEL.. Since literacy is the foundation for all learning, students will also explore their literacy experiences and how their experiences shaped their learning.

This course will focus on the foundational skills of SEL to support all learners.

Focus skills:

- Self-awareness of strengths using a growth mindset
- Self-management of stressors and impulse-related issues
- Social awareness of others developing empathy and inclusion
- Relationship skills: communicating positively and negotiating conflict constructively
- Decision making skills-making constructive choices

Learning Goals After this course, each student should be able to:

- Identify the fundamentals of social and emotional learning and how they apply to their individual learning
- Identify and present the competencies and practices that contribute to being a successful learner.

TECHNIQUES FOR DEVELOPING READING AND LANGUAGE 50:300:309
